From early dawn 'till the crickets sing their evening's last repose We've cozied up with Patrick's team to curb our hunger woes


So,

Tony Nunes, De Anza College



Hall of Fame coach Tony Nunes passed away on New Year's Day. Nunes, who was inducted into the California Community Colleges Men's Basketball Coaches Hall of Fame in 1990, was De Anza College coach from 1967 to 1991. He concluded his career with a 480-262 record, making him the College's winningest basketball coach at De Anza. Nunes also served as the college's athletic director. He was 91 years of age.

"He was a great teacher, administrator and mentor," Jason Damjanovic, current instructor at De Anza, said.

"He was always willing to provide advice even after his coaching days at De Anza were over. This is a tremendous loss not only for the basketball program but the department and institution."

Nunes, the college's first men's basketball coach, won five conference championships. Six times, he was selected as the conference's Coach of the Year. He also served as the CCCMBCA president.

FODARA After-Words will provide you with some technology tips in each new issue. This tip, courtesy of Kevin Metcalf, Interim Associate Vice Chancellor of ETS, explains how to automatically send "junk" email to your "junk" email folder in Outlook.

If a vendor or spammer won't stop sending things, try this:

- 1. Go to https://outlook.office.com/mail/
- 2. Click the gear icon in the upper right corner




3. Click Junk Email tab in the middle of the window



- 4. Click the "+ Add" link
- 5. Copy and paste in the offending email address and press enter
- 6. Press "Save" at the bottom right



That should automatically move the messages into your junk folder. (Junk emails are cleared out after 30 days.)



If you want to instantly delete them instead, you can follow the instructions above, but instead of using Junk Email, use the "Rules" tab, and add a rule with condition "From: <offending address>" and action "Delete".

Also, if you right-click on any folder in outlook.office.com, you can apply a retention policy to that folder. (5-years, 1-year, 6-mo, 1-mo, 1-week.)

Sadie Hawkins Dance Given by Social Committee


The social committee will give its fourth dance of the year on Nov. 7 entitled the Sadde Hawkins dance. It will include a hayride and a dance with sandwiches and music.

SPOTLIGHT ON DON NICKEL AND VICKY MORENO



Most years Don and Vicky enter their wines in amateur winemaking contests such as the California State Fair. Three expert judges taste each wine 'blind' and score a wine based on qualities such as clarity, bouquet, acidity, taste, overall quality etc. and tally a score which can result in an award ranging from Best of Show (the highest) to bronze (the lowest). For the FODARA event they will pour a few varietals including their 2021 Sonoma Cabernet Sauvignon, which earned a double gold this past year.

On February 15, 3-5 pm, Don Nickel and Vicky Moreno will share some of their wines at the FODARA Valentine's Party. They have been making wine for 28 years, some good and some, they say, undrinkable. What they have enjoyed in this journey is not only learning the craft itself, but the sense of community they have developed over the years as they have made wine with many friends. According to Don, the first question most people ask is do they have our own vineyard. They do not. Instead, they purchase grapes from Paso Robles to Sonoma to Plymouth usually in quantities ranging from 500 to 2,000 pounds. They built a cellar in their garage to store their wine. Their equipment includes a crusher, de-stemmer, press, a bottler, and stainless-steel tanks and oak barrels for storage. Usually, they make two or three red varietals each year in quantities that can be stored in a 30- or 60-gallon barrel.
