“Message from the President”

Welcome to Fall quarter! I must begin by thanking and acknowledging District Academic Senate President Mayra Cruz, DA Senate Vice-President Jim Nguyen, DA Senate Treasurer-Secretary Alicia De Toro, and outgoing DA Senate Treasurer-Secretary Paul Setziol for helping to make my transition to the Senate President role (which I last occupied from 2011-2013) as seamless as possible. I am also appreciative of the time I've spent with a number of faculty, staff, administrators, and students this summer—there are too many names to list, but know that whether you stopped to chat with me for five minutes or helped with scheduling or resolving an issue, or met with me for 30 minutes or more, I do thank you.

At this time of considerable political, societal, and environmental turmoil, the Senate can empower faculty by encouraging opportunities for “time to bond and share with colleagues and students some renewed approaches to learning, teaching, and social justice that will ground the path toward further intersectional alliance and progress,” as English department chair Roseanne Quinn stated recently. **An easy thing you can do in your first days of classes is to announce to your classes your awareness that the October 5 deadline for DACA permit holders to renew their DACA status is quickly approaching, and to show the De Anza “Resources For Undocumented Students” website <http://www.deanza.edu/students/undoc-students.html> which has a link to apply for a scholarship to pay the \$495.00 application fee required by the Department of Homeland Security.**

I would also like to work together with faculty to activate a Senate committee who will help brainstorm ideas to encourage greater understanding of issues impacting our diverse groups and communities, and build intersectional alliances. **Please contact me if you are interested.**

Academic Senate and Office of Instruction are also partnering to further assist faculty research academically appropriate OER (Open Educational Resources) course content that would be zero/low-cost for students and help lower one barrier, which is high textbook costs, to student enrollment and success. Thanks to Shagundee Kaur (Speech), who served as our first OER Faculty Coordinator this past Spring, and helped set up a prestigious OER campus partnership with OpenStax. She created a **new OER Resource website: deanza.edu/academic-services/oer/**. Please check it out! We look forward to working with new OER Faculty Coordinator/s who will hopefully be named soon.

Here are some state legislative mandates that we worked on ensuring campus compliance with this summer:

AP/GE Exams: As of this fall, state legislation requires that all students who have a score of 3 or higher on any AP exam will be awarded General Education credit in specified GE areas. Academic Senate is informing departments and collecting feedback from them on updates to the GE courses and credits awarded for AP exam scores of 3 or higher.

Associate Degrees for Transfer (ADT): We are continuing to update newly approved degrees (Congratulations, Economics and Anthropology!) and check in with departments about submitting new degrees for approval.

Finally, I wish to share that my family had to put our 14-year old beloved dog, Desi, to sleep. Desi came to us 11 years ago when De Anza faculty Julie Sartwell connected me with his previous owner, who was looking for a new home for him.

Jim Nguyen, Academic Senate Vice President

Greetings and welcome back to a new academic year! I hope you have had a wonderful summer, whether you were teaching, working on projects or enjoying the time off. I'd like to extend a warm welcome to our new Senate officers this year, Karen Chow (President, English) and Alicia De Toro (Secretary/Treasurer, Environmental Studies/Science). I am looking forward to working with them and think we will make a very strong team this coming year.

I am now in my second year as Vice President of Senate and Co-Chair of the Instructional Planning and Budget Team (IPBT). By now, you have probably read Chancellor Miner's message about our current and near-term budget situation and the budget cuts we will undergo over the next three years due to the enrollment declines we have seen over the past several years. It was just a few years ago we were in a similar situation to the one we find ourselves in now.

Two things stand out to me as being vitally important as we move through the next three years where we will be making budget cuts and facing likely falling/flattening enrollments: the importance of collaboration and keeping student success at the forefront of our work.

Let's face it, De Anza is a large institution where it is easy to mainly focus on the area in which we primarily "live". Our current challenges call on us to think more broadly about how we are moving forward as a college and district as a whole. How are our individual programs and departments situated in the bigger picture? What are our programmatic strengths and weaknesses, and where are the opportunities to meet our students' needs? I think now is a great time to think strategically about where we have been, where we are now, and what we could be in the future.

I have been engaged with the IPBT and a sub-group of that team, the Enrollment Advisory Team (or "EAT") over the last year exploring ways in which we can grow our enrollments. We've discussed and explored marketing, high school outreach, and scheduling among other strategies and I invite your input and experiences as we continue to seek ways to stabilize our enrollment this coming year. For example, we are fortunate that the state is investing in Career Education in community colleges through Strong Workforce Initiative funding, so we see this as a potential growth area for the college.
